DATA PROTECTION ACT

So far we have had to spend £150 on registration fees under the provisions of this Act although we could claim exemption on the

grounds that we are an "incorporated members club." There are, however, important conditions that we must fulfil before such exemption can be claimed. The first is that every member must be asked and must record in writing that they do not object to having their details kept in a computer. When we asked that question some three years ago a very small number of members objected, although they gave no reasons for their objections. As a result we were obliged to register. Since that first registration our membership application form has incorporated a suitable question and so all new members have been able to express their acceptance. There remains the matter of acceptance by members who joined before the modified form was introduced. This aspect is now being dealt with in a different way by the following question distributed to every member by this Newsletter:

- > Do you object to having your membership information stored in a computer?
- ➤ If you do object you must notify the me in writing not later than 22nd March 2000 giving your reasons for objection.

You are assured that the information contained in the database is strictly for administrative purposes within our U3A and will in no circumstances be revealed to any third party without your permission. You may also, if you desire it, be given a copy of the information kept about you, subject to whatever costs may be involved.





NEVER HAS SO MUCH BEEN SQUEEZED INTO SO LITTLE



The above comment comes from the Design Age Newsletter, and is a comment on one rail region's attempt to squeeze its passengers into ever-narrower train seats. (Not like our recent helpful speaker from Chiltern Railways). A number of U3As have set up groups to look at issues of design which relate to the needs of older people. These groups have already held one seminar in London, and hope to arrange another. Their newsletter makes fascinating reading.

The issues raised vary from the joys at public cycle paths in Germany populated in large numbers by third agers whose cycles were fitted with trailers to enable them to go supermarket shopping; to the installation of continuous carriers (or escalators) installed alongside long flights of stairs in some railway stations to enable suitcases and parcels to be carried painlessly between platforms.

U3A Bath is visiting local schools which use computers for A—Level design studies: Cardiff is collaborating with the School of Product and Engineering Design of the University of Wales Institute. They meet with students and staff who are preparing projects for assessment and offer constructive criticism. On an international scale, Reading is in touch with U3A colleagues in Australia and New Zealand who are piloting an imaginative project to provide courses by Internet to isolated older people who are unable to benefit from a local group. One London group is investigating the signposting in three major hospitals, (and photographing inadequate signs).

The newsletter is full of exciting ideas - perhaps Aylesbury will one day have an equally worthwhile Design Group!

You may remember that last summer Mid-Bucks U3A member Brian Ewart invited our members to join with his members in a short exploratory series of waterborne activities on the Thames at Marlow. He has arranged another series of activities as follows.



1. MONDAY, 8th May 2000. 09:45 to 15:30hrs

Introduction to a rowing boat; practical experience in rowing and manoeuvring; heaving a line; sculling over the stern; some bends & hitches.

£9.00 PER HEAD - MAX 8 PERSONS.

2. MONDAY, 15th May 2000. 09:45 to 15:45hrs

Introduction to rowing as a crew of a 4 oar Gig (21ft) or a 6 oar Jolly Boat (18ft), (Taking control of the boat and its crew).

3. MONDAY, 22nd May 2000. 09:45 to 16:00hrs.

£9.00 PER HEAD - MAX 8 PERSONS.


4. SUNDAY 11th June 2000. 19:30 overnight to 09:30hrs Monday 12th.



Read Jane Asher's "The Question" and/or Doris Lessing's "The Summer before the Dark".


14th July Historical Novels e.g. Anya Seton, Jean Plaidy, Georgette Heyer.


TRIP TO THE MILLENNIUM DOME




COMPUTERS IN AYLESBURY VALE U3A

In our U3A there is a continuing interest in and use of computers. The CUSS group has rapidly developed to a membership of around 30. In our own committee 3 members have bought a computer system since the beginning of the year. Many people are unsure whether to go ahead and acquire a PC due to the uncertainty as to how much they would really use it. If doubtful, computers with Internet access may be used in the larger County libraries at a charge of £1 per half-hour. The Third Age Trust have produced a leaflet (dated September 1999) entitled "Advice on buying a computer & software"-of which I have copies to loan.

The degree to which computer systems are now used in the running of our U3A is quite considerable. For administration support there is a Membership database and a Groups database. The production of the Directory and the Quarterly Newsletter are both carried out using a desktop publishing programme. We are now on the World Wide Web as are a number of other U3As. This site has reciprocal links with the Third Age Trust; with Aylesbury Vale District Council regarding Leisure Activities; and Bucks County Council regarding Continuing Education. This means that other people, wherever they may be, can see what we do in the Aylesbury Vale U3A just as we can see what others do. Users with access to the Internet invariably use email as a way of forwarding information between organisations, or within organisations such as we do at Aylesbury Vale.

Given the importance of these systems it is necessary that we keep to industry standards regarding practices and products used. Systems should be easily transferable between personnel whenever the need arises.




